Infections

Before treatment with Remicade

- Tell your doctor if you have an infection even if it is a very minor one
- It is very important that you tell your doctor if you have ever had TB, or if you have been in close contact with someone who has had TB. Your doctor will test you to see if you have TB. Ask your doctor to record the type and date of your last screening(s) for TB on the card
- · Tell your doctor if you have hepatitis B or if you know or suspect you are a carrier of the hepatitis B virus.

During treatment with Remicade

Tell your doctor straight away if you have signs of an infection. Signs include a fever, feeling tired, (persistent) cough, shortness of breath, weight loss, night sweats, diarrhea, wounds. dental loss, night sweats, diarrhea, wounds, dental problems, burning when urinating or 'flu-like' signs.

Pregnancy and vaccinations

In case you have received Remicade while you were pregnant or if you are breast-feeding, it is important that you inform your baby's doctor about it before your baby receives any vaccine. Your

baby should not receive BCG live vaccine (used to prevent tuberculosis) within 12 months after birth unless your baby's doctor recommends otherwise. For all other live vaccines, a six-month waiting is recommended.

Keep this card with you for 4 months after your last dose of Remicade, or in case of pregnancy for 12 months after the birth of your baby. Side effects may occur a long time after your last dose.
